The Significance of Indigenous Theories for Educational Studies in Europe

Conference at the University of Education in Freiburg, Germany, 21/22 September 2023

In the context of European educational studies, some attention has been given to postcolonial theories in the last decades and, more recently, to decolonial approaches. Nevertheless, the inspiring potential of indigenous theories in the field of education has scarcely been noticed, especially in German-language educational science. At the same time, in a post-colonial world society confronted by multiple crises, an awareness of theories different from hegemonic Western perspectives seems increasingly necessary, and not only in the field of education.

Nevertheless, the idea of non-indigenous academics learning from indigenous theories and the aim of applying those theories in the context of Western science come with an inherent risk of reproducing a colonising gesture in this aspiration, and thus must incorporate a reflection of how to deconstruct pre-existing hierarchies among different bodies of knowledge, as well as debate on questions of solidarity and recognition.

The aim of the planned conference is to explore the fruits and pitfalls of recognising indigenous theories in the context of educational science in Europe. A special emphasis will be put on German-language countries and Kaupapa M \bar{a} ori, a rich and complex indigenous philosophy and practice developed by M \bar{a} ori theorists in New Zealand/Aotearoa. Together with Te Kawehau Hoskins and Alison Jones, professors at Te Puna W \bar{a} nanga, the School of M \bar{a} ori and Indigenous Education at the University of Auckland/Waipapa Taumata Rau in New Zealand/Aotearoa and both experts on Kaupapa M \bar{a} ori, the following questions will be discussed:

- In what ways are educational thinking and practice in European German-language countries influenced by (post-)colonialism and ideas (and stereotypes) of indigeneity?
- Which aspects of indigenous philosophies and, in particular, Kaupapa Māori can be regarded as usefull challenge in relation to unquestioned assumptions in Western educational science? How can the claim of Western science to hegemony be called into question? How can a power-sensitive project of translation between a privileged and a marginalised knowledge set be realised without reproducing existing inequalities? How can such a scientific project be based on the possibility of non-mastery and uncertainty and still produce valuable results? What might the results of those translations in relation to educational practices in German-language countries be?
- How can the problematic aspects of non-indigenous scholars' aspirations of engaging with indigenous theories be dealt with? What are the important cornerstones for cooperation and the building of relationships between indigenous and non-indigenous researchers in such a project? In what ways can such cooperations contribute to international solidarity and allyship in a world society marked by inequalities and escalating crises?
